# Student Spotlight

Amanda Pomeroy '94, a Biology major and Environmental Studies minor, is also a Student Assistant at the Center for Women's Studies. After a semester of planning and gathering information, Amanda will be reorganizing Colgate's Women in Science.

When asked about the purpose of Women in Science, Amanda stressed the need to provide information and resources specific to women in scientific fields. "The group would encourage first and second year tudents to continue with science classes, and help female majors by providing them with information about jobs, graduate school, medical school and scholarships."

Last semester Amanda surveyed female science and math majors to determine the programs they felt would be most effective. Using the survey information as a guide, Women in Science is planning discussion groups with students and professors, inviting speakers, and hosting other informal meetings.

The impetus for Amanda's involvement comes both from personal experience and from the experiences of her peers. Noticing that many female science students had the same questions and fears, she states: "I wanted to help ease women's transition into the fields of math and science, and help them find the funding and career opportunities available."

Currently Amanda is applying for National Science Foundation grant to do independent research on aquatic ecology in Wales.

## From the Director...

It's great to be back! I spent my Fall sabbatical researching and writing about the influence on today's feminist movement of the civil rights, anti-war, student, and women's liberation movements of the 1960s. I was especially concerned to explain the increasing separation of these movements for social change from one another, and the often uneasy relationship existing among them today.

My study analyzes the extent to which justice and equality for women has been slowed by the absence of coalitions among such groups. From my research thus far, it seems clear that cooperation among social movements is necessary to counter the formidable strength of those who would impede women's progress in our society.

While I was investigating these issues, Ellen Kraly as Acting Director of the Women's Studies Program, and Becca Etz, our Program Assistant, did a terrific job of moving our Program ahead. The Center for Women's Studies is bustling with activity, and we are offering fifteen courses Spring Semester. I want to thank both Ellen and Becca for their commitment and excellent work.

This Spring, Colgate's Women's Studies Program is again proud to join millions of women and men around the world in celebrating International Women's Day on March 8. We will mark the day with a series of events. (see calendar)

As I think about International Women's Day, my heart goes out to women - like those in Bosnia and other areas of the world - who are suffering the terrible effects of civil war. They must find ways somehow to cope with rape, starvation, dislocation and even death. We need to remember those women whose lives are full of pain.

But March 8 is also a time to celebrate women's strength and determination to end that pain. The Global Summit on Women — for which American representatives will travel to Taiwan next month - is one of many international efforts to promote peace, overcome poverty, and ensure that women share power equally. As the call for the Conference states:

"Women around the world speak many different tongues and embody all cultures, colors, and classes, but they can be united in their common quest for a healthy, economically just, and peaceful planet."

Come join us on International Women's Day, and for the many other programs listed in our calendar. We want you to get to know us. We want to learn about you!

## Cristina Brautigam to Visit

September 1995 will see the United Nation's Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing, China. Cristina Brautigam of the UN, the primary coordinator of the conference, will visit Colgate on February 10th. She will explain the concerns of the United Nations, the purpose of the conference, and her involvement. Her lecture is scheduled at 7:00 pm in the Women's Studies Classroom.

Ms. Brautigam will be presented with a petition, signed by Colgate students, addressing the human rights of women. The petition also calls on the United Nations to proactively address women's world-wide and cross-cultural concerns.

The September 1995 conference is a continuation of efforts begun during the United Nation's declared International Decade of Women, 1975 to 1985. During that time, three international conferences on women's issues were held, most recently in Vienna. Together, they have helped to create an international women's movement dedicated to justice for women.

# Women in Black at Colgate

Women in Black will be a month-long campaign at Colgate for awareness and support of women's peace efforts around the globe. Black ribbons, much like AIDS ribbons, will be made available through the Center for Women's Studies for every member of the Colgate community. We will be distributing information on Women in Black, and a member of Women in Black will address a Colgate audience on March 9, to celebrate International Women's Day. Silent vigils will also be planned.

Women in Black is an international collective of groups of women protesting the atrocities of war torn countries. Often, women on both sides of the conflict will join forces and jointly demonstrate against the violence.

Women in Black first began in England, protesting the British occupation. Since then the group has appeared all over the world, protesting all forms of occupation, oppression and killing. Protests most often involve silent vigils in high traffic areas by women dressed in black to mourn the dead.

Weekly silent vigils by *Women in Black* have been occurring in countries such as Israel for many years without interruption.

The following statement, signed by women from Cyprus, Turkey, Serbia, Croatia, Israel, Palestine, South Africa, Russia and Morocco was endorsed in Bangkok, Thailand at the 1992 Conference on Women Overcoming Violence.

#### A Resolution by Women from Countries at War

We are women from countries with conflicting interests and countries at war, who have seen bloodshed, the loss of life, and the loss of dignity as a result of racism, sexism, antagonism, and militarism. These have given rise to internal strife, military intervention, or foreign occupation.

We demand that our voice be heard as a condemnation against violence as a means of resolving any problems in a state or between states. We demand an immediate end to the war and violence between opposing sides within our countries and the immediate withdrawal of foreign occupying forces from our countries.

We, victims of violence and war, demand that all differences be resolved through peaceful negotiations, and that every measure be taken for enhancing the quality of life. We shall not support efforts that do not respect human rights or that use violence against people (women or men), whether in their own countries or against other countries.

# Colgate Students Petition the United Nations

Student Assistants from the Center for Women's Studies will be collecting signatures from Colgate students in January and the beginning of February to petition the United Nations. This petition is one of hundreds being coordinated by the Center for Women's Global Leadership at Rutgers University, Douglas College.

Headed by Charlotte Bunch, the Global Campaign for Women's Humans Rights was first introduced by a coalition of more than 900 women's organizations. The Global Campaign seeks to find ways to highlight women's social and economic rights during the World Conference on Women in Beijing, and to force the United Nations into action on these issues.

The petition reads as follows:

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights protects everyone "without distinction of any kind such as race, color, sex, language...or other status" (art. 2)...In addition, the 1993 Vienna Declaration of the World Conference on Human Rights states that the "Human rights of women and of the girl-child are an inalienable, integral and indivisible part of universal human rights," and declares a commitment to eliminate "violence against women in public and private life." Therefore, we the undersigned, call upon the United Nations to fulfill this commitment and to report on its efforts to promote and protect women's human rights at the Fourth World Conference on Women.

#### **International News Briefs:**

.... Iran: In June 1993, close to 800 women were arrested in Tehran for olating Islamic dress codes requiring women to conceal all but their face and hands. President Hashemi Rafsanjani called the enforcement "a duty as important as prayer."

... Turkey: 1993 saw the first woman elected as Turkey's Prime Minister. Tansu Ciller's victory has been hailed "as proof of Turkey's secularism and allegiance to the West." Ciller formed alliances with "pro-family" conservative parties during her campaign. This could effectively block any attempts to address pressing issues such as domestic violence and divorce law.

. . . Thailand: January marks the one year anniversary of Charatsri Teepirat's official appointment as Governor of the Nakhon Nayok province. Chosen by the Prime Minister, Teepirat is the first woman ever to govern one of Thailand's 73 provinces. After nullifying the law that excluded women from holding top administrative positions, Prime Minister Leekpai stated, "From now on, sex will not count while capability will."

# Campaign for Change

- I. Petition the United Nations The Petition for Women's Human Rights at Colgate is part of a global campaign (see p.2 of this Newsletter). The petition calls for the United Nations to uphold the Vienna Declarations proactively preventing violence against women and to report on its progress.
- II. Magazine Letter Campaign The Center will be launching a letter-writing campaign aimed at popular women's magazines. This is a continuation of the Women in Media project begun last semester by Student Assistants. The campaign will communicate women's disgust at the harmful and exploitive use of their bodies in media and advertisements.
- III. Women in Black at Colgate March will represent a month-long campaign for awareness and support of Women in Black, an international peace organization. Women in Black protests all forms of occupation, oppression and killing. In war torn countries, women from both sides unite to end the killing. The group also addresses the particular war crimes experienced by women and offers supplies and shelter to female refugees and their children.
