From the Director...

The New Year is always a time for reflection and celebration, and, in this context, I have been thinking about the past thirty years of feminist activism. For it was thirty years ago that the Second Wave of the Women's Movement, dedicated to achieving equality for women, originated with the founding of organizations like the National Organization for Women. Has this goal of equality been achieved? During the Spring semester, four important lectures sponsored by the Women's Studies Program will address this question.

Mariah Burton Nelson, a former member of Stanford University's basketball team, will speak on the significant role that the expansion of women's athletics has played in women's changing position in our society. Nelson points to the enormous increase in sport participation of girls and women facilitated by Title IX, and argues that such opportunities have contributed to better health and higher self-esteem for women. However, Nelson is critical of the segregation and continuing secondclass status of women's sports on all levels, and calls for an increase in coeducational sports as a partial remedy.

In celebration of International Women's Day, **Professor Uma Narayan** of Vassar College will discuss global feminism. I heard Professor Narayan speak at this year's National Women's Studies Association meetings. She eloquently summarized the gains that the women's movement has made in India: the growing numbers

of young girls who are now permitted to attend school; and the increasing prevention of domestic violence against women long associated with the practice of dowry-giving in arranged marriages. Despite this progress, Professor Narayan emphasizes the growth of religious fundamentalism in India and elsewhere which is becoming a serious threat to women's advancement and equality. In the guise of cultural traditionalism, she argues, conservatives are mounting a vigorous effort to reverse the gains women have made.

Wendy Kaminer will be the keynote speaker at Colgate's Annual Women's Studies Leadership Conference. As a free-lance writer and National Public Radio commentator, Kaminer takes a critical but ultimately supportive view of today's feminist movement. In assessing feminism's last thirty years, she criticizes what she sees as a change from the women's movement's early emphasis on fighting for equality in the labor force, in politics, and in the law. Today she argues, feminists are increasingly focused on more personal issues, and too often feel that the changes they need to make can be accomplished individually. Kaminer disagrees, arguing that only in collective activism can the many problems women face - poverty, sexual violence, protection of reproductive choice, and political representation - be successfully addressed.

Finally, **Professor Hester Eisenstein** of Queens College will offer her assessment of contemporary feminist thought. As the author of one of the first books bringing together the

disparate strands of feminist theory, Eisenstein explores the question of what "liberation" means. She argues that feminist goals have not been achieved. Women are not yet liberated as the feminist movement first promised, but the significant changes in women's lives over the last thirty years have paved the way for the ultimate attainment of that goal. Eisenstein calls for coalitions between feminists and other socially and economically disadvantaged groups in a broad movement for justice and equity. With such coalitions, she believes, the promise of early feminism for a more equitable society can indeed be realized.
